



Youth Day: Intergenerational solidarity — **Creating a world** for all ages

O achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the world needs to leverage the full potential of all generations. Solidarity across generations is key for sustainable development. We must collaborate to foster successful and equitable intergenerational relations and partnerships to ensure "no one is left behind".

While intergenerational solidarity and concern for future generations is being called for in tackling global issues — with the UN secretary-general recently putting forward new recommendations on renewed intergenerational solidarity, including in Our Common Agenda — many challenges remain.

The Global Report on Ageism launched by the United Nations in March 2021 highlights the many data gaps that exist with regards to ageism against youth.

Despite this lack of research, young people continue to report age-related barriers in various spheres of their lives such as employment, political participation, health and justice.

On an individual level, these age-related obstacles can deeply impact wellbeing and livelihoods not only during the youth years, but also in adult-

On a societal level, ageism prevents us from thinking and designing policies and social services that adopt a life-course approach and are fair for all ages.

In this context, the objective of this year's International Youth Day theme, Intergenerational solidarity: Creating a World for All Ages, is to amplify the message that action is needed across all generations to achieve the SDGs and leave no one behind.

The 2022 International Youth Day also raises awareness on certain barriers to intergenerational solidarity, notably ageism, which impacts young and old persons, while having detrimental effects on society as a whole.

With the world's population expected to increase by two billion people in the next 30 years, just producing a larger volume of healthier food more sustainably will not ensure human and planetary wellbeing.

Older women face discrimination, bias, and marginalisation, as recognised by the General Recommendation Number 27 of the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women.

This discrimination, bias, and marginalisation is only further compounded for older women with disabilities.

They are systematically overlooked and underrepresented in development policies, programmes, initiatives, legislation, as well as humanitarian efforts.

Moreover, gender inequality, ageism, and ableism are further exacerbated by other forms of discrimination on the basis of race, ethnicity, caste, religion, migration status, among other factors.

Now is the time to address the interlinking challenges of gender inequality, poverty reduction, social inclusion, health care, biodiversity conservation and climate change mitigation.

Youth have been, and will continue to be a part of the conversations and action to restore the planet and integrating biodiversity in the transformation of food systems, and therefore will also remain closely engaged in the implementation work of the Action Coalitions that were launched during the Generation Equality Forum.

On International Youth Day, join us in uplifting the voices of youth and celebrating their leadership.

GALZ PRESS STATEMENT

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DAY

International Youth Day is a day of awareness, recognising youth across the globe and empowering the youth to make meaningful contributions to their communities and nations. The 2022 theme, "Intergenerational Solidarity, creating a world for all ages", recognises that the world needs to leverage the full potential of all, particularly the youth to build a better Zimbabwe.

Zimbabwean youth are facing a plethora of challenges that include; unemployment, identity crisis, substance and drug abuse that affects the health and well-being of youth in Zimbabwe. GALZ recognises challenges being faced by youth that identifies as LGBTIQ+ (Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex and Queer) which include; stigma and discrimination within communities and denial of access to employment and socioeconomic empowerment opportunities. LGBTIQ+ youth have not realised their full potential on account of their real or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity and expression. These collective obstacles have led to an increase in reported cases of suicide, violence, HIV, alcohol and substance abuse among LGBTIQ+ youth.

The 2022 theme highlights the urgency with which action is required to ensure opportunities are availed to youth to associate, be represented and participate in political, social, and economic spheres of life in line with the 2030 Agenda "Leave no one behind" which is the central and transformative promise of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals.

GALZ notes the development and implementation of the Zimbabwe National Youth Policy, the provision of the Youth bank and the creation of the Youth Quota in the Parliament of Zimbabwe. We encourage duty bearers to meaningfully engage youth so that they may actively participate in these and other initiatives. Government must work on impediments that hinder intergenerational solidarity.

GALZ encourages the Government of Zimbabwe and various stakeholders to implement an inclusive and robust legal and policy framework to protect youth from harmful cultural practices, exploitation and all forms of abuse. GALZ calls for the inclusion of LGBTIQ+ youth in the development agenda, guided by the "Leaving no one behind" mantra.

Intergenerational solidarity fosters a world that is inclusive of all persons and all ages.

GALZ is a membership-based association of LGBTI people in Zimbabwe that provides legal assistance, medical referrals, information resources, safe spaces as well as counselling and psychosocial support services to LGBTI persons and their families, colleagues and friends. Students And Youth Working on reproductive Health Action Team (SAYWHAT) joins the rest of the world in commemorating the International Youth Day. Since the turn of the new millennium, every year the world celebrates the youths on the 12th of August.

This year the commemoration is running under the theme, "Intergenerational solidarity: Creating a World for All Ages." This is a call for a collective voice across all generations to come together and see to it that the United Nations (UN) promulgated Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are met by 2030. Satisfying all the SDGs in the 21st century will ensure co-existence between all age groups of human kind and all its surrounding ecosystems. There is need of a collective solidarity to confront the climate change fires, emerging health problems, food shortages, and water supply among other key lifesaving determinants.

Solidarity refers to unity and agreement of individuals, groups, communities and societies who share common interests and visions. Zimbabwean youths across socio-economic and political divide need to come together and persuade the government and development partners to provide their health needs. Parents and guardians should also join the call and implore the government to take into account the youths' social and economic needs as denominators of their health needs.

In the past two years, cases of teenage pregnancy and child marriages have been reported at an alarming rate. The twin scourges also have a direct impact on the spread of HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) as well as child bearing complications which at times have led to the loss of young lives. This ultimately impacts on the girl child as she cannot fully realise her potential under such circumstances. In some cases, older people have been found to be the culprits of child pregnancies which brings into question the intergenerational solidarity.

Sexual Gender Based Violence (SGBV) has been growing exponentially. In Zimbabwe, a week hardly goes by without cases of sexual related violence involving the youths. Some youths have lost lives through either suicide or after being murdered by their partners. Reading these cases in the press should alarm every concerned person to rise and take part in raising awareness against sexual gender-based violence.

While the 2022 census, figures show that over 70 percent of the total population is formed by the youths, defeating deeply rooted and complex economic challenges faced in the country requires intergenerational effort to come up with techno-entrepreneurial innovations and skills. This is fundamental for all and sundry to meaningfully contribute to economic and social development of the country. The government should on a massive scale, introduce techno-entrepreneurial spaces to absorb thousands of graduates churned out of various colleges dotted across the country. The technological innovation hubs

recently planted at higher learning institutions across Zimbabwe, should answer to the education 5.0 questions.

Alongside the introduction of the innovation hubs at tertiary institutions, community based and less technical scientific hubs should also be introduced to attract non-college going youths so that no one is left behind in contributing to the economic development. This will also go a long way in bailing out the youths from drug and substance abuse carnival, commercial sex work, among other health damaging behaviours.

Today's international forums on economy, politics, climate change and health should see the youths having seats for them to be conscious of the challenges bedevilling the globe also proffer solutions. Climate change has emerged as one of the challenges that require solidarity from all age groups as it threatens

The International Youth Day should therefore not be just ceremonial. It should translate to life changing pro-youths' policies and strategies. It is high time the youths come together at regional, continental and internationally and make their voice heard. Regional and International bodies should deliberately create spaces for the youths for the intergenerational relationship to fully materialise. The youths should not just be incorporated as tokenism, but they should be listened to and heard. Happy International Youth Day to you all!!.

Local Works Zimbabwe Youth Program International Youth Day 2022 Essay Competition

Introduction and Background

The Youth Empowerment and Transformation Trust (YETT) is calling all young people between the age of 18-35 years with an interest in writing to enter the 2022 International Youth Day essay writing challenge.

The Youth Empowerment and Transformation Trust (YETT) is a youth networking organization committed to the full participation of young people in sustainable development through advocacy and capacity building of youth and youth organizations. YETT is facilitating the design and implementation of the Local Works Zimbabwe Youth Program which seeks to facilitate co-creation of holistic, inclusive, youth-led, and locally driven solutions that address the diverse challenges facing young Zimbabweans in meeting their social and economic needs and aspirations. In November 2021, YETT facilitated youth-led listening sessions which provided a platform for deep, nuanced listening and understanding on key issues of youth concern across all the 10 provinces of Zimbabwe. The listening sessions revealed that.

- 1. Most Zimbabwean youth do not have the enterprise skills required for one to one to ideate, prototype and grow a successful enterprise.
- 2. There is limited awareness of youth entrepreneurship development support amongst youth in Zimbabwe. Furthermore, the majority of youth enterprise financing products are disconnected from the lived realities of most Zimbabwean youth.
- 3. There is low meaningful youth participation in the decision making spaces.
- 4. Drug and Substance Abuse (DSA) among youths has reached alarming levels and is negatively impacting youth economic development "State of National Disaster"

Considering the above, YETT calls upon youths aged 18-35 to submit an essay explaining what activities you would do in your community to address any one of the four issues highlighted above.

The essay should.

- 1. Indicate your name, age, contact details and name of your community.
- 2. State the one problem/challenge/issue from the four highlighted above and show clear examples of how you would address it in your community. Your proposed interventions should show how you would use innovative, tech-based solutions.
- 3. Essays should not be more than 800 words and written in English.

In this perspective, the goal of this year's International Youth Day theme is to highlight the importance of action across all generations and leave no one behind, in order to accomplish the SDGs, the 2030 agenda adopted by all United Nations member states in 2015.

United Nations' Global Report on Age-

According to the United Nations' *Global Report on Ageism*, which was released in March 2021, young people continue to report encountering age-related obstacles in a variety of areas of their lives, including work, political involvement, health, and justice.
